Key Study Information

<p>This section provides a brief summary of the study. It is important for you to understand why the research is being done and what it will involve before you decide. Please take the time to read the entire consent form carefully and talk to a member of the research team before making your decision. You should not sign this form if you have any questions that have not been answered.</p>	
It's Your Choice	This is a research study. Being in this research study is your choice; you do not have to participate. If you decide to join, you can still stop at any time. You should only participate if you want to do so. You will not lose any services, benefits or rights you would normally have if you choose not to take part.
Research Purpose	The purpose of this research is to see whether a Facebook group will help Native women in recovery from opioid use. You have been asked to take part in this research because you are a Native woman recovering from opioid misuse, and you are currently taking medication for opioid use disorder.
What's Involved	This study includes at least 4 visits. They may be over the phone, Zoom, or in-person. Procedures include urine drug tests, and surveys. You will be randomly assigned to a study group: 1) Facebook group or 2) No Facebook group. Study visits happen over the course of 6 months. The shortest visit may take 10 minutes; the longest visit may take up to 30 minutes. You will be paid for your participation.
Key Information	The risks of this study are minor. They may include the inconvenience of answering questions and doing urine drug tests. You might continue to experience minor withdrawal symptoms and side effects from your medication.



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	<p>If you are assigned to the Facebook group, you may encounter some additional small risks. They may include discomfort engaging with Facebook posts. We will emphasize that no personal information shared in the group should be shared outside the group. There is also a small risk that the health information you share might be leaked despite our best efforts to keep the group private and secret. If you are assigned to get the online resource guide, you may feel inconvenienced by the process of contacting or trying new programs.</p> <p>The risks associated with study participation are completely described later in this form, be sure to review them carefully. While our study is research and not guaranteed to offer help, you may benefit from the treatment if it works. You do not have to participate in this research. Instead of being in this research study, your choices may include local inpatient and outpatient services or behavioral health programs.</p>

The information in this form will help you decide if you want to participate in this research or not. A member of our research team will talk with you about taking part in this study before you sign this form. If you have questions at any time, please ask us.</p>

Making Your Decision

Taking part in research is your decision. Take your time to decide. Feel free to discuss the study with your family, friends, and healthcare provider before you make your decision. Taking part in this study is completely voluntary and you do not have to participate.

If you decide to take part in this research study, you will sign this consent form to show that you want to take part. We will give you either a printed or electronic copy of this form to keep.

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Why are you being asked to take part in this research study?

You are being asked to take part in this research study because:

1. You are an American Indian or Alaska Native adult woman in Minnesota
2. You self-reported no opioid misuse within the past 30 days
3. You are currently taking medication for opioid use
4. You are comfortable speaking and reading English
5. You either have or will create a Facebook account if you are assigned to the Facebook group.

The plan is to have 60 Native women in recovery take part in this study at Mayo Clinic.

Why is this research study being done?

Native organizations in Minnesota wanted the Principal Investigator to help with the opioid epidemic among the Native community. The Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center designed the study concept with the Principal Investigator. Native researchers, health care providers, research staff, and women in recovery help us with this study.

The purpose of this study is to find out whether a Facebook group will help Native women in recovery from opioid use. We do not know how easy and acceptable it is to use a Facebook group for this purpose. We do not know how useful the online resource guide is in the real world. This study may not help you. However, we hope the information from this study will help us figure out the most useful online social support for Native women in recovery.

Information you should know

Who is Funding the Study?

Mayo Clinic and the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) are funding the study.

Information Regarding Conflict of Interest:

This research has been reviewed by the Mayo Clinic Conflict of Interest Review Board and is being conducted in compliance with Mayo Clinic Conflict of Interest policies. We have no conflicts of interest to report.



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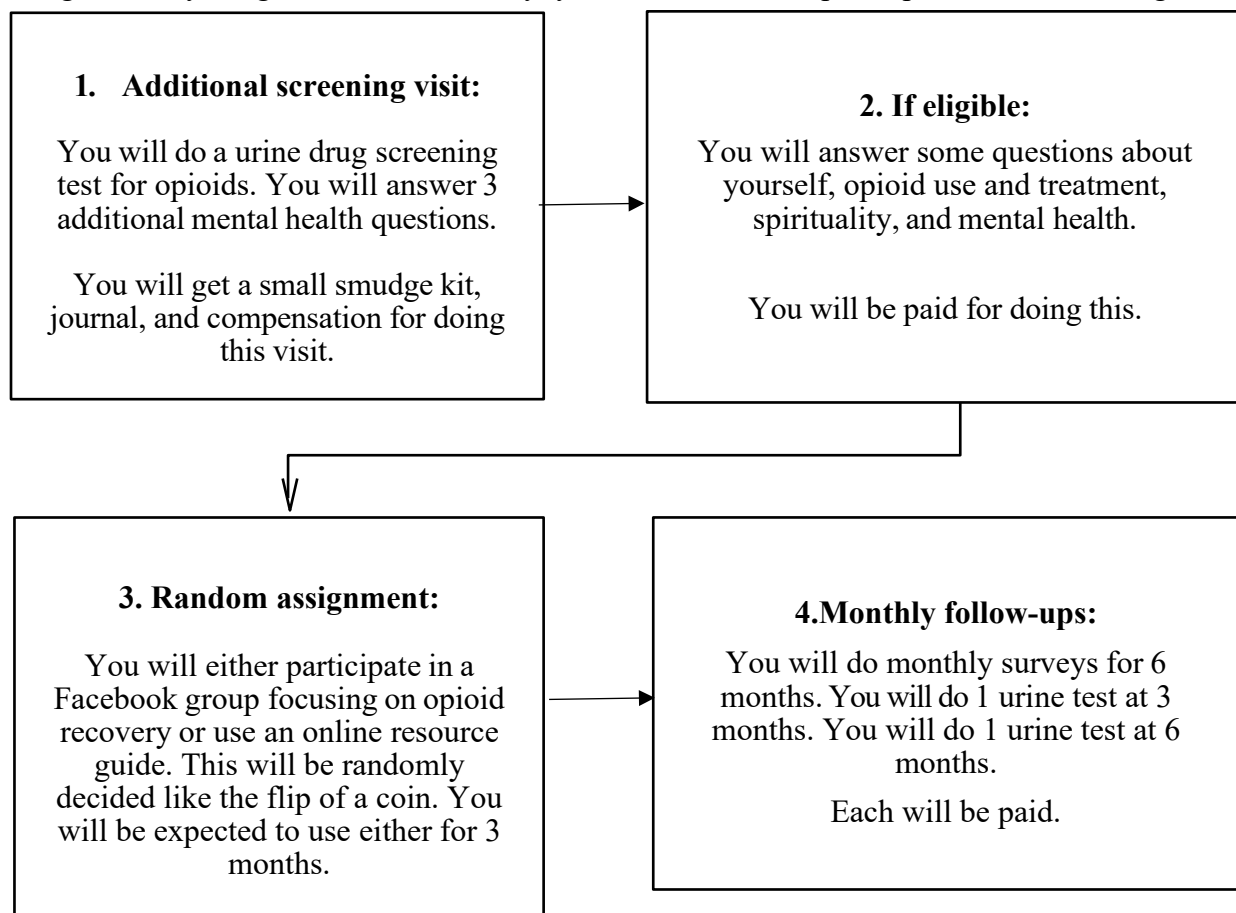
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How long will you be in this research study?

It will take you about 6-10 months to complete this research study. During this time, we will ask you to make about 4 study visits. These can be done over the phone, Zoom, or in-person. If you are randomized into the control group and agree to participate in the Facebook intervention, you will be involved for a 10-month period of time.

What will happen to you while you are in this research study?

If eligible and you agree to be in the study, you will be asked to participate in the following:





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Below is some key information about the **urine drug tests**.

- Morphine, oxycodone, fentanyl, poppy seeds, and other opiates can be detected by the test cards within a few days of use. At screening, you will not be able to continue with the study if the test cards are positive for any of these.
- The cards have high accuracy for positive results. Please understand that we will use the cards as confirmation of opioid use, even if you self-reported no use. The cards cannot tell if it was prescription use or secondhand exposure.
- You have two options for doing these:
 - Zoom: The study staff will ship all the needed materials to you for a video call. You will need to set aside a time where you can be in a private, comfortable space. This means you are not in a public space where anyone else can hear or see your results. Having a small child with you is ok. The space will need to have a bathroom door visible on-camera. You will be asked to provide the actual sample off-camera and “muted”. The camera will be left on so the coordinator can see you come in and out.
 - In-person: You may do the test at the Indian Health Board in Minneapolis. You and a Mayo Clinic study coordinator will be in a private room.
- Your medication for opioid use, including buprenorphine or methadone, can be detected by the test cards. These do not count toward your eligibility if you reported their use.
- The test card also includes strips for amphetamine, barbiturates, benzodiazepines, cocaine, methamphetamine, ecstasy, phencyclidine, tricyclic antidepressants, and marijuana. These do not count toward your eligibility.
- The results of the urine drug test won’t become part of your medical record, but they will remain part of your study record. Your individual urine test results will not be shared with anyone outside of the Mayo Clinic research team. Any urine test results reported in research presentations and papers will be presented collectively with no connection to you or other individuals.

You may also agree to receive a newsletter from the study team covering this study’s most clinically relevant research results.

What are the possible risks or discomforts from being in this research study?

You will be asked some sensitive screening questions related to suicidal ideation that may make you uncomfortable. We will provide additional resources if needed.

You may feel inconvenienced by taking time out of your day to complete urine drug tests and answer questions about yourself. The urine drug test is similar to what you would do at a routine



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care visit. If you have a positive result, you may feel embarrassed or uncomfortable in front of the research staff who did your test.

If you are assigned to the Facebook group, it is impossible to predict what the other participants will post on the Facebook group, so some posts may make you upset, make your cravings stronger, bring up stressful memories, or cause you to relapse. We do not know how a Facebook group program for AIAN women recovering from opioid use will affect them because none have existed before. You may alert the study team if a specific post or comment upsets you.

If you are assigned to get the online resource guide, you may feel inconvenienced taking time to use the guide and find out which resources would be most useful to you. Programs and organizations may not answer your phone calls or emails. They may also not have room for you. These situations may make you upset or frustrated.

Since you are taking medication for opioid use disorder, you may continue to feel withdrawal symptoms and/or side effects from your medication. Please note these side effects are not related to study participation. The following table lists possible side effects.

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As with all research, there is a chance that confidentiality could be compromised; however, we take precautions to minimize this risk. Your information will not be shared with anyone else except for the research team. If you get assigned to the Facebook group, the group moderators will emphasize that everything shared in the private, secret group stays in the private, secret group. To protect the identity of other participants, please use the Facebook group in a private space so others cannot look at your device and view the content/other participants. We may organize Facebook Live guest speaker events with AI/AN experts in Native culture and opioid recovery. We ask that you do not share personal information about yourself with speakers coming into the group so that your identity and personal health information can remain protected. We may also have members of the research team hold Facebook Live events, in which case, this restriction does not apply.

Your study ID will be destroyed at the end of the study, and the urine sample will be destroyed once the results are ready.

Are there reasons you might leave this research study early?

If you do not pass the eligibility screening urine drug test or fail the additional screening questions, you will not be able to participate in the study further. We will destroy all screening data if you are not eligible. Nobody else beyond the Mayo Clinic research team will be notified that you, individually, were ineligible.

If you decide to stop taking part in the study for any reason, we will ask you to make a final study visit via phone, which will take about 15 minutes. At this visit, you will complete the follow-up survey outlining your experience in the Facebook group, your opioid use and medication use throughout your participation, your spirituality, your mental health, and any serious events that may have happened to you throughout your participation.

If you decide to leave the research, contact the Principal Investigator so that the investigator can decide if any additional tests should be done for your safety. You may be removed from the Facebook group if that is what is best for you.



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What if you are injured from your participation in this research study?

Where to get help:

If you think you have suffered a research-related injury, you should promptly notify the Principal Investigator listed in the Contact Information at the beginning of this form. Mayo Clinic will offer care for research-related injuries, including first aid, emergency treatment and follow-up care as needed.

Who will pay for the treatment of research related injuries?

Care for research-related injuries will be billed in the ordinary manner to you or your insurance. You will be responsible for all treatment costs not covered by your insurance, including deductibles, co-payments and coinsurance.

What are the possible benefits from being in this research study?

This study may not make your health better. The Facebook group and online resource guide can be thought of as supplements rather than a replacement for medication and/or treatment. However, it is possible that they may help you learn of new recovery skills and resources.

What alternative do you have if you choose not to participate in this research study?

You don't have to be in this research study to get help for your recovery from opioid use. Your other choices may include local inpatient or outpatient services as well as behavioral health programs. These can be found at various clinics in Minneapolis, MN, including the Indian Health Board, Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center, Native American Community Clinic, and Community-University Health Care Center. Talk to the Principal Investigator or your doctor if you have any questions about any of these programs.



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What tests or procedures will you need to pay for if you take part in this research study?

You will not need to pay for the urine drug tests, which are done just for this research study. However, you and/or your insurance will need to pay for all other tests and procedures that you would have as part of your clinical care, including co-payments and deductibles.

If the results of the urine drug test performed for research may be useful for your health care, you may be notified. If you decide to follow up, any further medical testing will be considered part of your clinical care and will not be paid for by the research study. Costs will be billed to you or your insurance.

If you have questions about any costs to you that may result from taking part in the research, please reach out to the Principal Investigator.

If you have billing or insurance questions call Patient Account Services at the telephone number provided in the Contact Information section of this form.

Will you be paid for taking part in this research study?

You will get \$25 for doing the baseline survey. You will get \$25 for each follow-up survey. You will get \$50 for each urine drug test no matter what your result is. We also will provide every individual who completes screening (phone survey and urine test) with a small smudge kit (sage and cedar) and journal as “thank you” gifts for completing their first visit.

If you are able to complete the entire study, you will receive up to \$325. If you are assigned to the online resource guide group and opt to get the Facebook group at the end, you may get an additional \$25 for an end-of-intervention follow-up survey. In order to provide this compensation, the study team may need your Social Security number.

You may choose to be paid using the Greenphire ClinCard, a pre-paid debit card that functions like a bank debit card. The study team will load your study payments on the Greenphire ClinCard once you complete a study visit. For Mayo Clinic employees, research payments are included in your paycheck.



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If a physical ClinCard cash card must be mailed to you, it will be mailed with no funds to reduce the risk of someone intercepting and using the funds. To have the funds added to the card, you will need to call a member of the study team at 1-822-880-2600. You will be asked to verify:

- a. Last 4 digits of the card's token number (on the outside of the envelope)
- b. Participant first and last name
- c. Participant address
- d. Participant date of birth

To get paid with the ClinCard, Greenphire will need to process certain personal information about you. Your name, address, and date of birth will be given to Greenphire ClinCard. This information will be collected from you by the study staff and given to Greenphire. If you choose to not provide the required information to Greenphire, the study team can have a check issued to you through the mail. Alternatively, you may opt to choose individual Mayo Clinic Credit Union cash gift cards per survey and test you complete.

Payment for participation in research is considered taxable income and reportable to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). You will be required to provide your Social Security number to receive any individual research payment of \$300 or more, or if you receive research payments totaling \$600 or more in a calendar year. Accounts Payable at Mayo Clinic will be given your name, address, date of birth, and Social Security number in order to issue payment for your study participation. If you receive research payments totaling \$600 or more in a calendar year, a tax Form 1099 will be sent to you. For Mayo Clinic employees, research payments are included in your paycheck with applicable taxes withheld and reported on your Form W2 after calendar year-end.

Will your information or samples be used for future research?

Your information and samples collected for this study will not be used or shared for future research studies, even if the identifiable information such as your name or date of birth is removed.

How will your privacy and the confidentiality of your records be protected?

Mayo Clinic is committed to protecting the confidentiality of information obtained about you in connection with this research study.



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Your data will be de-identified and coded with numbers in Mayo Clinic's password-protected Research Electronic Data Capture (REDCap) software. Your screening data will only be used to describe the population that was either found to be ineligible for this study or were uninterested in participating. Your urine sample will be destroyed immediately after recording the results. Research materials are kept in a folder protected by the password-protected Mayo Remote Access Client.

Also, we have obtained a **Certificate of Confidentiality** from the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). The Certificate is designed to prevent us from being forced to disclose identifying information for use in any federal, state, or local civil, criminal, administrative, legislative, or other court proceeding, even if faced with a court subpoena. You should understand, however, that a Certificate of Confidentiality does not prevent you or a member of your family from voluntarily releasing information about yourself or your involvement in this research. We may not withhold information if you give your insurer or employer or a law enforcement agency permission to receive information about your participation in this research. This means that you and your family must also actively protect your own privacy.

The Certificate does not prevent us from taking steps, including reporting to authorities, to prevent serious harm to yourself or others. Such disclosures will be made as described below.

The research team may share your information with:

- DHHS, to complete federal responsibilities for audit or evaluation of this research;
- Public health agencies, to complete public health reporting requirements;
- Mayo Clinic representatives, to complete responsibilities for oversight of this study;
- Your primary care physician if a medical condition that needs urgent attention is discovered;
- Appropriate authorities as needed to prevent serious harm to yourself or others.

During this research, information about your health will be collected. Under Federal law called the Privacy Rule, health information is private. However, there are exceptions to this rule, and you should know who may be able to see, use and share your health information for research and why they may need to do so. Information about you and your health cannot be used in this research study without your written permission. If you sign this form, it will provide that permission (or "authorization") to Mayo Clinic.

Your health information may be collected from:

- Past, present and future medical records.
- Research procedures, including research office visits, tests, interviews and questionnaires.



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Your health information will be used and/or given to others to:

- Do the research.
- Report the results.
- See if the research was conducted following the approved study plan, and applicable rules and regulations.

Your health information may be used and shared with:

- Mayo Clinic research staff involved in this study.
- Other healthcare providers involved in your clinical care.
- The sponsor(s) of this study and the people or groups hired by the sponsor(s) to help perform this research.
- The Mayo Clinic Institutional Review Board that oversees the research.
- Federal and State agencies (such as the Food and Drug Administration, the Department of Health and Human Services, the National Institutes of Health and other United States agencies) or government agencies in other countries that oversee or review research.

How your information may be shared with others:

While taking part in this study, you will be assigned a code that is unique to you, but does not include information that directly identifies you. This code will be used if your study information is sent outside of Mayo Clinic. The groups or individuals who receive your coded information will use it only for the purposes described in this consent form.

If the results of this study are made public (for example, through scientific meetings, reports or media), information that identifies you will not be used.

In addition, individuals involved in study oversight and not employed by Mayo Clinic may be allowed to review your health information included in past, present, and future medical and/or research records. This review may be done on-site at Mayo Clinic or remotely (from an off-site location). These records contain information that directly identifies you. However, the individuals will not be allowed to record, print, or copy (using paper, digital, photographic or other methods), or remove your identifying information from Mayo Clinic.

Is your health information protected after it has been shared with others?

Mayo Clinic asks anyone who receives your health information from us to protect your privacy; however, once your information is shared outside Mayo Clinic, we cannot promise that it will remain private and it may no longer be protected by the Privacy Rule.



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Your Rights and Permissions

Participation in this study is completely voluntary. You have the right not to participate at all. Even if you decide to be part of the study now, you may change your mind and stop at any time. You do not have to sign this form, but if you do not, you cannot take part in this research study.

Deciding not to participate or choosing to leave the study will not result in any penalty. Saying 'no' will not harm your relationship with your own doctors or with Mayo Clinic.

If you cancel your permission for Mayo Clinic to use or share your health information, your participation in this study will end and no more information about you will be collected; however, information already collected about you in the study may continue to be used.

Your permission for Mayo Clinic to use and share your health information lasts until the end of this study, unless you cancel it. The study does not end until all data has been collected, checked (or audited), analyzed, and reported. Because research is an ongoing process, we cannot give you an exact date when the study will end. Sometimes this can be years after your study visits and/or activities have ended.
